

rare grouping of three master tapes-Atries by Gloria F. Ross—renowned tapestry producer and long-time member of Congregation Emanu-El—is now on view at the Bernard Museum of Judaica. Ms. Ross worked with dozens of America's top artists during her 20th century career in essence to "translate paint into wool." By applying the Renaissance tradition of tapestry making to high-modernist paintings, she provided bold, convincing translations and also posited a revised model for a centuriesold mode of artistic collaboration. In addition, Ms. Ross' efforts helped spark renewed interest in tapestry as an art form in the United States and abroad.

SAGE AND REVOLUTIONARY: THE WRITINGS OF MAIMONIDES

N THEIR OPEN LETTER to the congregation for the New Year, our clergy discussed several new initiatives intended to enrich the Jewish life of Temple Emanu-El. Included among these was mention of a congregationwide "book read." Consequently, we are proud to introduce "EMANU-EL READS...."

"EMANU-EL READS..." is a community learning experience. The entire congregation spends the better part of a year reading one book, studying its meaning and significance. As part of our exploration of the themes of the book, we have organized a series of lectures, activities and study sessions that broaden our understanding of the book and bring its ideas into sharper focus. The journey concludes with a communitywide book discussion session, where each of us will have an opportunity to dialogue with fellow congregants about our impressions of the book and its meaning.

The book selected for this year's congregational read is **MAIMONIDES**, a succinct, literary biography written by Sherwin B. Nuland that is part of the Jewish Encounters project.* Dr. Nuland chronicles the life and works of the great medieval Jewish philosopher who shaped Jewish thought in his time and whose influence endures.

A prolific Torah scholar and a dedicated physician who served a sultan, Maimonides sought to harmonize rational, scientific knowledge with the demands of faith. His prodigious, wide-ranging writings dealt with medicine, ethics, God, faith, evil, the afterlife, the Messiah and the striving for intellectual perfec-

tion. What he had to say often sparked controversy and vigorous disagreement.

By choosing this subject matter, we hope to open the door for serious discussion. And, in selecting this book, we hope to engage as many of our congregants as possible. One of the benefits of Dr. Nuland's book is its accessibility. As he writes in the *Prologue*, "It is not a book for scholars. Its aims...are clarity and conciseness....No previous knowledge of Moses ben Maimon or of his era is required, nor of philosophy, medicine, Judaica or academic methods."

With this in mind, many thanks go out to congregant Maxwell Moss and to the Men's Club Reading Group for their inspiration regarding this choice of book and in the creation of this program. Additional thanks are offered to Temple librarian Elizabeth Stabler for organizing and coordinating this series, with the aid of Elka Deitsch, senior curator of the Bernard Museum of Judaica.

So don't be left out...buy the book... read it...and join your friends and fellow congregants in a stimulating and multifaceted exploration of the fascinating world of Maimonides.

EMANU-EL RESTORATION EARNS TOP HONOR

AFTER COMPLETING a two-year restoration of the Main Sanctuary and Beth-El Chapel, TEMPLE EMANU-EL has been awarded the title of "Best of 2006" in the

field of rehabilitation, renovation and restoration by New York Construction magazine. New York Construction is a monthly trade journal, published by McGraw Hill, that focuses on the Real Estate industry in the tristate area.

An award will be presented to Temple Emanu-El and those who participated in the project—especially Tishman Interiors—at a special breakfast to be held Dec. 15, 2006,

at Manhattan's Marriott Marquis hotel. December 15 also is the day on which Congregation Emanu-El will rededicate its Temple. The rededication ceremony will

occur during that evening's Sabbath service, which corresponds to the first night of Chanukah and marks the start of the season of rededication.

In being named "Best of 2006,"
Temple Emanu-El was selected
by a jury of architects, contractors, engineers and developers.

Projects receiving honorable mention include NYC's Top of the Rock observation deck, the NY Public Library's Map Division and the Coney Island Parachute Jump Tower.
