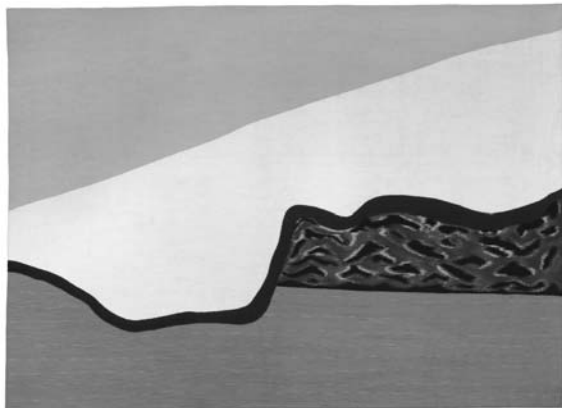

WOVEN ABSTRACTIONS (On display through October 18)

A rare grouping of three master tapestries by Gloria F. Ross—renowned tapestry producer and long-time member of Congregation Emanu-El—is now on view at the Bernard Museum of Judaica. Ms. Ross worked with dozens of America's top artists during her 20th century career in essence to “translate paint into wool.”

By applying the Renaissance tradition of tapestry making to high-modernist paintings, she provided bold, convincing

translations and also positioned a revised model for a centuries-old mode of artistic collaboration.

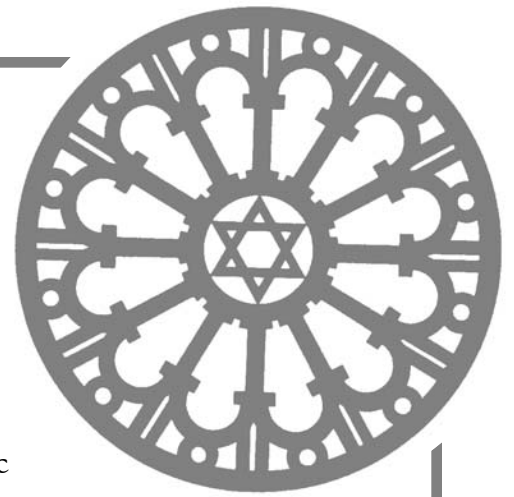
In addition, Ms. Ross' efforts helped spark renewed interest in tapestry as an art form both in the United States and abroad.

Ms. Ross' work hangs in museums across the country, including New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, the Art Institute of Chicago and the Textile Museum in Washington, D.C. In 1997, while retired from professional work, Ms. Ross helped produce an ark curtain designed by Mark Podwol for Temple Emanu-El. She died the following year at age 74.

This letter from New York City Council member Domenic M. Recchia, Jr., concerns a family whose plight was brought to the attention of Rabbi Posner.



Dear Dr. Posner:

On January 11, 2006, a disastrous fire took the lives of three children in Coney Island. The deaths of Ricardo Clark, Jahyria Sheffer and Jahnae O'Pharrow devastated not only their family members but also our entire community. Never have I witnessed such a heartfelt outpouring of selfless support by an entire community. So many Good Samaritans reached out to help the Clark-Sheffer family to rebuild their lives.

Because of your generous donations, we were able to raise \$7,200. These contributions helped to pay for the burial and headstone and also are assisting the family to start anew.

On the tragic day, the family lost everything it possessed. I will never be able to fully express my gratitude and pride for the way you responded to the needs of your neighbors. It is an honor to represent and be associated with the finest New Yorkers who reached out to help a family in their time of need.

I recently came across a quote that perfectly describes my sentiments:
