The Women's Auxiliary, The Men's Club and The Religious School Parents' Organization invite Temple members and their guests to their annual joint opening meeting. Appointed the 14th dean of Columbia Law in July 2004 at age 35, David



Schizer became the youngest dean in school history and the youngest at the country's top law schools. After joining Columbia's faculty in 1998, Professor Schizer made his course in tax law one of the most popular on campus. He won the Willis Reese teaching prize,

and he was granted tenure at 33. In May 2005, Dean Schizer, now 36, was selected for *The National Law Journal*'s "40 Under 40" listing of leading young lawyers. He also is a former clerk for U.S. Court of Appeals Judge Alex Kozinski and Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg.

### Summer at Skirball



# SANCTUARY RESTORATION REACHES HALF-WAY POINT



As illustrated in our photo of the South Gallery, the line of demarcation has been reached in our Sanctuary Restoration Project. Phase I—which focused on the rear half of the Main Sanctuary and a complete restoration of both the Fifth Avenue lobby and Beth-El Chapel—has been completed, thus allowing full use of the Main Sanctuary during High Holy Days. We will enter Phase II, involving the front half of the Main Sanctuary and its bimah, immediately following the conclusion of Succos.

While the Main Sanctuary is closed, the Beth-El Chapel will be available for life-cycle events. Sabbath worship services, however, will be held in the Leon Lowenstein Sanctuary (10 East 66<sup>th</sup> Street) until Phase II is complete, prior to High Holy Days 2006. The Temple will be rededicated formally on the first night of Chanukah of that year—Friday, December 15, 2006.
