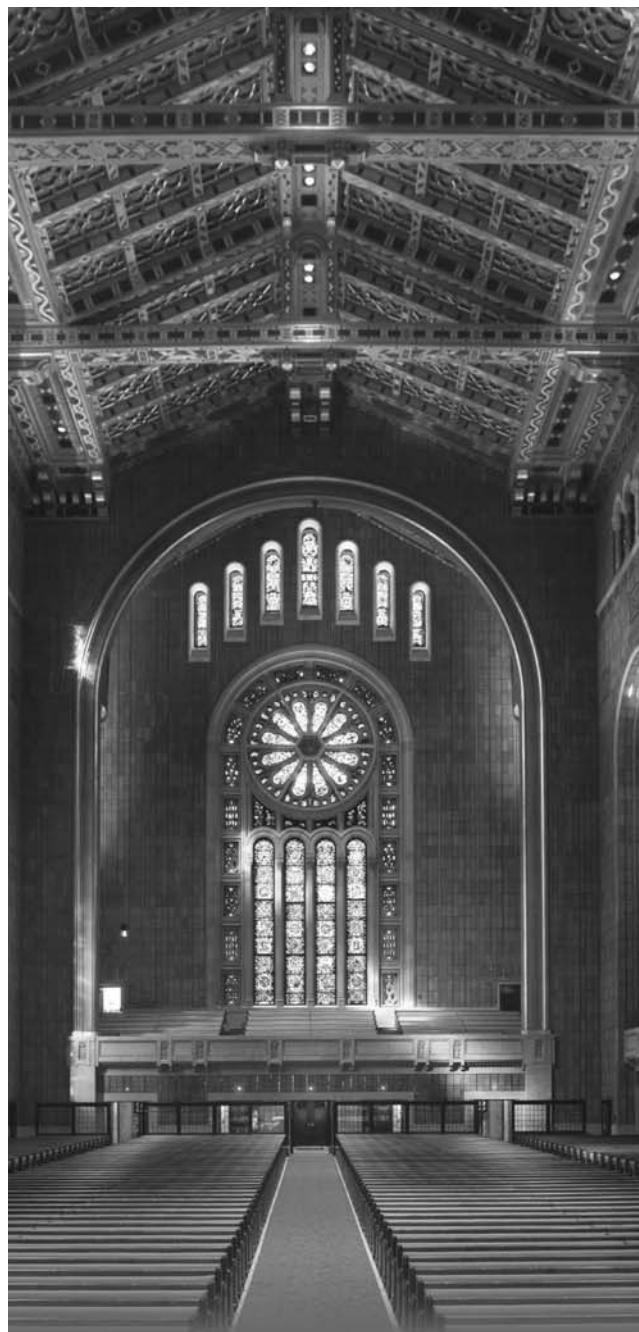

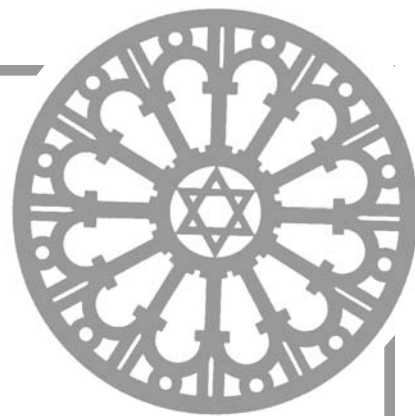

## EMANU-EL HONORED

Representatives from Temple Emanu-El found themselves among distinguished company on the evening of May 1, 2007, as they were presented, on behalf of the congregation, with a **Lucy G. Moses Preservation Award for 2006** by the **New York Landmarks Conservancy**. Named for a dedicated New Yorker whose generosity benefitted the city for more than 50 years, the Lucy G. Moses Awards are the Conservancy's highest honors for outstanding preservation efforts. The awards recognize preservation leaders, public officials, organizations, owners, builders, architects and craftspeople who restore the beauty and utility of New York's greatest architecture.

The award was presented at a private ceremony and reception held in I.M. Wise Hall.

Attendees also were provided with tours of our sanctuaries and the Bernard Museum throughout the evening.
