No city on earth commemorates the Holocaust like Berlin does. In place of the victims, it is the perpetrators who erect the monuments. Heartfelt, disarming and provocative, these memorials occupy the city's empty spaces and central squares. At their best, they bond a deep historical engagement to the most sophisticated contemporary public art and architecture. In a highly interactive and intense seminar, NOAM M. ELCOTT explores Berlin's mnemonic topography and rethinks the commemoration of the Shoah (Holocaust), contemporary German culture and the nature of collective memory in the public sphere.

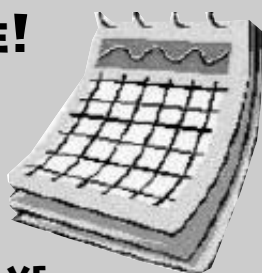
