WHO WILL SAY KADDISH?

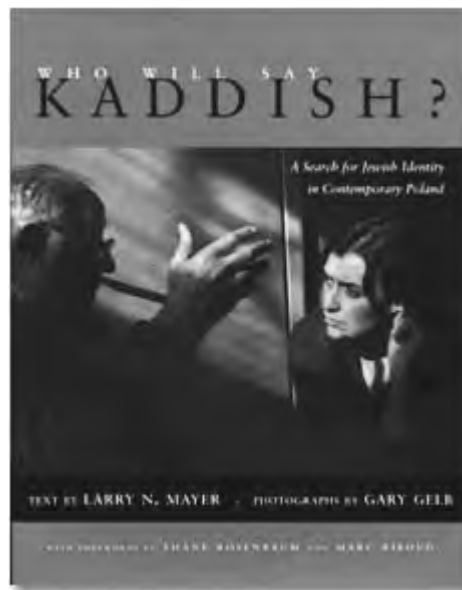

Some say there are no Jews left in Poland today. Come meet photojournalist **Gary Gelb** as he dispels this myth and provides insight into the contemporary Jewish community in Poland. In 1995, Mr. Gelb traveled with the writer Larry Mayer to document what was left of Poland's Jewish community. Together they published *Who Will Say Kaddish? A Search for Jewish Identity in Contemporary Poland* (Syracuse University Press, 2001).

At this special event sponsored by the Women's Auxiliary, Mr. Gelb comes to Temple Emanu-El (One East 65th Street) where he will narrate a slide show of his images and share stories about the people he met on his journey, including a Jewish priest (who never knew he had been born a Jew) and the first bat mitzvah in Poland. A book signing will follow.
