But according to Freud, all dreams contain a "navel," a spot that defies understanding, that "reaches into the unknown." In the Midrash, that unfathomable element in the lives of Jacob and Joseph is represented by Rachel, the "unknown woman" in their narrative. Literature, film and psychoanalytic thought will enrich our study.

Rabbi Michael Marmur, our Emanu-El Reads scholar-in-residence.




# HOLY SPACE, HOLY TIME SATURDAY, MAY 3 10:30 A.M. FIFTH AVENUE SANCTUARY

As the Holiness Code from the book of Leviticus is read, Rabbi Marmur will consider where Jews look for holiness. Making use of a major distinction between "Time" and "Space" to be found in the thought of Abraham Joshua Heschel, Rabbi Marmur will present some of the key dilemmas and major opportunities presented by the State of Israel.

**RABBI MICHAEL MARMUR** is the dean of the Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem. He was ordained as a rabbi in the Israel Program of HUC and has a doctorate from the Department of Jewish Thought at Hebrew University. His 2005 dissertation was on the thought of Abraham Joshua Heschel. Along with his administrative responsibilities, Rabbi Marmur lectures and teaches frequently in Israel and around the world, including the United States and Canada.

How Immigrants in Performing Arts Transformed American Film. Theater and Music


