in Exile*, guest speaker

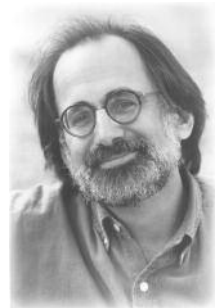

Mr. Heutlinger has worked for Temple Emanu-El for nearly two decades. Prior to that, he was the administrator of the National Conference on Soviet Jewry (NCSJ) and was one of the organizers of the historic "March on Washington, D.C. for Soviet Jews," which was held during Mikhail Gorbachev's visit with President Ronald Reagan in 1987. After receiving a master's degree in business administration, he began working for various social-action, nonprofit organizations in Washington, D.C., and in San Francisco, where he developed a strong connection to the Grateful Dead.

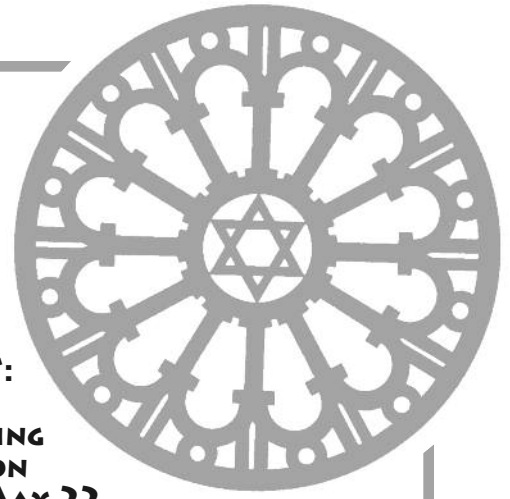
