A Day of Memory

Dear Emanu-El Family:

In the *Kiddush* recited on Rosh Hashanah, the Holy Day is referred to as Yom HaZikaron: The Day of Memory. Indeed, memory is one of the great themes of our New Year. The Shofar Service for Rosh Hashanah is divided into three distinct sections: *Malchuyot*—passages referring to God's kingship; *Zichronot*—verses referring to God's providential memory; and *Shofarot*—passages relating to the meaning of the shofar.

Zichronot—memories. Who can doubt that human memory takes many forms? Some of our experiences we remember vividly. Of others, we have no recollection at all. There are the times when we block out the unpleasant events, and there are the things that we wish we only could forget. Often our lifelong perception of a person is colored by the memory of a particularly exceptional experience. We also go through life with memories of "the old days"—our old neighborhoods, our schools, our young loves. And it is no idle fig-

ure of speech when people say that their memory is playing tricks on them. It does—more than we are capable of knowing and more than we want to admit.

But on Rosh Hashanah, we focus on not our memories but on those of the Holy One. Jewish doctrine maintains that God's memory is of another kind entirely. It is perfect in terms of accuracy, and it is not limited by time. For God, the past, present and future are not clearly delineated. Rather, we are seen in God's eyes as the totality of everything we ever have done—our potentials, our drives, our ambitions and our values.

It is as though the total person is shaped not by a succession of isolated experiences but by the sum of all experiences. We might liken this to an accountant's reckoning of a client's net worth. The many trans-



were all simultaneous and eternal. For this reason, God not only judges our total lives. He judges the entire world in its totality.

This concept of the totality of God's remembrance—of what was, of what could have been and of what ought to be—explains the frequent references made by the ancient Sages to the "ashes of Isaac," the very Isaac about whom we read on Rosh Hashanah, who was placed on the altar by his father, Abraham. Of course, we know that there were no ashes because Isaac was not actually slaughtered and burned as an offering. But, in the larger understanding of God's memory, the ancient Sages understood: Isaac was willing—even anxious—to become an offering, if such was God's will. His devotion was so total that in spiritual terms, he was considered an actual offering.

In God's eyes, as much was accomplished by Isaac's desire as if he had been reduced to ashes. God knows the intent. He knows the heart. Even for this we can be given credit. And because of this, we can be forgiven.

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
