A Decade of 13,000 Reasons to Be Proud of Skirball

ARCH 23, 2013, WAS a day of celebration at the Skirball Center for Adult Jewish Learning at Temple Emanu-El. That morning we reached 13,000 student registrations in just 10 short years! We did not have balloons falling from the ceiling or cameras capturing the moment, but we had a deep sense of joy for bringing Torah



to so many individuals thirsty for a deep, intellectual experience and yearning for a spiritual journey in an environment of sophistication and dialogue.

The path of education is paved with the bricks of renewal. We always must search for new ways to enlarge and deepen the learning experience. It is for this reason that we would like to share just one of the many innovative programs recently launched by Skirball.

THE GROUNDBREAKING JUDAISM AND CHARACTER STRENGTHS WORKSHOP

This past April, a group of 16 curious minds engaged in the first of six workshop sessions marking a unique experience in Jewish learning. The goal of this workshop was to bridge the gap between innovation and tradition.

As per innovation, developed in the last two decades, a new psychological school of "Positive Psychology" has emerged, focusing on human strengths such as creativity, love of learning, courage and perspective. This school of psychology identifies those human strengths such as the ones above, thus cultivating and maximizing one's positive qualities. Unfortunately, because of the constant threat of anti-Semitism and anti-Zionism and as a reaction to the fear of assimilation, Judaism (enter tradition) largely has adopted a defensive stance. In the course of living within this defensive stance,

TEMPLE EMANU-EL IS proud to provide an induction loop system in our Fifth Avenue sanctuaries to assist those members of our congregation as well as visitors who may be hard of hearing. Hearing aids must be switched to the "T" (telecoil) setting. Infrared assistance listening devices also are available for use in all of our sanctuaries, including Greenwald Hall and the Leon Lowenstein Auditorium. Portable receivers and headsets or neck loops are available from a lobby attendant or usher; picture ID is required.

Pinchas

(Numbers 25:10-30:1) Read Saturday, June 29 **Synopsis:** Pinchas is appointed a kohein (priest); Moses is told to go into battle against the Midianites in retaliation for their trickery; Moses conducts a census of the Israelites and divides them into tribes; laws of inheritance are discussed; Moses is told to prepare for his death; Joshua is named Moses' successor; details about public sacrifices are discussed.

SPECIAL NOTICES ABOUT reserving seats for the High Holy Days are being enclosed with the **2013-2014** membership dues statements. **Renewal of seating is not automatic; renewal forms MUST be returned to the Temple Office by the date specified.** Members of the Temple with existing seating assignments will have the opportunity at that time to reserve the same seats or add, release or request to change their seats.

Additional seating reservations may be purchased and added to your membership account anytime after you receive the first seating renewal notice. We do our best to provide seats as close to your existing reservations as possible. Each member with a seating reservation will receive a set of tickets for all services. Tickets are mailed two weeks prior to the High Holy Days.

Tickets for the Family Worship services are available at no additional cost to all members with young children and to all our Nursery School and Religious School parents who wish to attend services with their children and extended families.

College students, both Temple members and nonmembers, who do not already have seats are invited to join us for High Holy Day Services in the Lowenstein Sanctuary. Simply present a current college ID at the Beth-El Chapel entrance on Fifth Avenue on the day of the service, and you will be given an entrance ticket for that service. The Beth-El entrance is open 30 minutes before each service.

SEATING RECIPROCITY

Temple Emanu-El members in good standing who will be out of town during the High Holy Days may obtain a **Courtesy Seating Form** to present for admission to another Union for Reform Judaism member temple. Similarly, Emanu-El will provide complimentary tickets for out-of-town relatives of members or out-of-town visitors who arrange for courtesy seating.

If you are affiliated with another temple and wish to attend services at Temple Emanu-El, please call your home temple and ask them to forward a **Reciprocal Seating Request Form** to us. This process takes time to complete, so please plan ahead.

Reciprocal tickets to attend services at Temple Emanu-El are held for pick up at the Beth-El Garden Entrance door just prior to services.

How to Become a Member

THE MINIMUM MEMBERSHIP CONTRIBUTION for the fiscal year beginning June 2013 is \$1,390. We currently offer two exceptions to this: a reduced rate for Associate Members (individuals between age 21 and 29) and a Full Family Membership. Dues are billed in June each year and cover most aspects of membership in Temple Emanu-El, including services by the clergy, use of the facilities, access to member-only events and services, and special consideration at events open to the public. Dues also are a credit toward seating during the High Holy Days.

Small additional fees are required for membership in our Temple auxiliaries—the **Men's Club** and the **Women's Auxiliary**. Enrollment in Temple Emanu-El's **Religious School** is open to children of Temple members only. In addition to the fees for Temple membership, families will be charged tuition for each child enrolled. The tuition rate for the 2013 fiscal year is **\$1,075** per child **(\$50 discount for complete applications received before July 31)**.


This annual program is planned entirely by the Emanu-El co-chairs and their committee.

questions of individual fulfillment have been shelved. Ultimately, for many, Judaism has ceased to affect their lives as a source of strength and meaning. In this first workshop of its kind, the participants were encouraged to explore and develop a Judaism that uses the tools of Positive Psychology to match their strengths within Jewish meaning and practice.

Is there a correlation between our personal strengths and our Jewish journey?

How were we planning to bridge this gap between innovation and tradition? With the help of VIA. Established in 2001 and led by Drs. Donna and Neal Mayerson, the VIA Institute on Character has as its core mission to advance both the science and practice of character. To that end, Donna and Neal gathered the leading scholars and practitioners in the field of Positive Psychology who, for three years, studied how cultures across centuries understood what was best about human beings and how we could put to use those positive characteristics in order to build optimal lives for ourselves. The work resulted in a landmark publication, Character Strengths and Virtues by Christopher Peterson and Martin Seligman, and the VIA Inventory of Strengths Survey. Since then, the VIA Institute has perfected the VIA Inventory Survey instruments

used by leadership institutes, corporations and coaches across the globe. More than 2 million people in 193 countries and 17 languages have taken these surveys.

Each one of the participants in the Judaism and Character Strengths Workshop took the VIA inventory and worked individually and within the group to match their VIA results with their Jewish experience. We addressed important questions such as: Is there a correlation between our personal strengths and our Jewish journey? Has our personal Jewish experience and education maximized our personal strengths or not? What ritual and practices can we adopt and develop within Judaism to reinforce and expand our personal strengths? What would a Jewish community look like that gathers people with different strengths? Is there a correlation between our vision of the Divine and our personal strengths?

We had faith that this cutting-edge experience would regenerate Judaism, offering paths that will welcome those in search of personal fulfillment and meaning. We were not wrong. The response from the participants has been overwhelmingly enthusiastic, but perhaps we shouldn't be surprised. Judaism always has learned from the best of its surrounding cultures. Positive Psychology is becoming one of the most effective and recognized tools for personal and communal fulfillment. We are proud that Skirball and Emanu-El are leading the path in connecting the latest scientific research on human development and Judaism.

The workshop, led by Dr. Donna Mayerson, Dr. Neal Mayerson and Rabbi Alfredo Borodowski, Ph.D., is being underwritten by the Mayerson Family Foundations.

Wedding Riddle

Zerah Yaakov Ben Raphael Naftali Katz Venice (Italy), ca. 1780

WEDDING RIDDLES, known in Hebrew as *hiddot*, were an extremely popular form of Hebrew poetry. The riddles customarily were handed out several days before the marriage ceremony in order to provide guests with the necessary time to solve them. The riddling contest took place during the wedding feast as part of the entertainment in honor of the newlyweds. Judges were appointed to supervise the competition, which had the potential, if left unregulated, to become raucous and unruly.

This and other fascinating vignettes of Jewish history and culture are on display in our current exhibition The Writing on the Wall: Early Modern Broadsides From the Valmadonna Trust Library.
